#### 2022 Yankee Chapter Test Director Report

In 2022, the Yankee Chapter used 921 chukar, 87 pheasants, and 188 ducks. Over the past six years during my time as Director of Testing these numbers have gone up 22% (Chukar) to 65% (ducks). The need has been growing and hopefully the supply will also be there for our needs in the future. In 2023, we will use a new supplier for our ducks, as Jim and Laurie Olmstead have decided to stop raising them.

Our year started with significant concern of Avian Flu, but due to the careful and likely time-consuming efforts of Foggy Ridge Game Birds, Merrymeeting Kennels, and many others, we escaped the season unharmed and with plenty of healthy birds for our training and testing requirements.

Thanks to the volunteers and test workers that consistently pitch in and pull off great test weekends. Also, many thanks to our judges near and far, many of whom were used and abused during the rigorous International testing schedule of 2022. We appreciate all the local judges who always make time for us and give up time away from their families for us to test our dogs and have them evaluated.

This is my last report as Yankee's Director of Testing. I'd like to wish my successor good luck in the coming year and offer my support and assistance where needed. I'd like to close by saying that serving on Yankee Chapter's board has been a meaningful, rewarding, and educational experience in many ways and I'm grateful for the knowledge many have passed on to me during this time.

#### **Director of Communications Report**

First, I'd like to thank all the members of the Communications Team for their work this past year. These folks make up a well-oiled machine that made my job so easy.

To start the year, Nancy Anisfield conducted a survey of Yankee Members to see how effective our various communications channels were performing and see where the membership thought we could improve. We heard back that most folks were happy with our multi-pronged approach to communications with email, the Barking Dog Express newsletter, Facebook, and the website. There were also some constructive comments that we heard and used to improve things.

Our newsletter continues to be an important piece of our communications package. Most folks said they read the newsletter 'cover to cover' and said they wouldn't change much. A couple of suggestions that did come, and that Nancy has implemented since last Spring were to have more pictures, and add a 'Ask the Pro Trainer' Q&A section.

I want to thank Judie Bayles for all the work she has done with sending out emails through the years, many times being asked to send out chapter wide messages without much notice. It is greatly appreciated.

We did hear feedback that people weren't always getting our emails. We were getting flagged as spam by some email providers. Over the past couple of months, the team has been working on ways to improve email deliverability going forward and we think we have a plan in place to accomplish that goal. We have set up Mailchimp to be our email delivery platform, and we have hooked it up to our yankeenavhda.org domain sending the emails as <u>news@yankeenavhda.org</u>. Sending emails from our official domain should allow us to build up a good email reputation score and wind up in far less spam folders. Nancy also set up a great template for the emails, so they will have a more professional look to them. Look for these new emails to start hitting your mailboxes in the new year.

Facebook continues to be a strong central communications hub for the chapter. Misi does a great job of communicating events, sharing pictures from those events, and keeping the chapter engaged. I know that I enjoyed being able to see people respond to Misi's posts with pictures of training or during hunting season.

Feedback for the website was good overall. I think in 2023 that we may need to pursue an upgrade to the platform. It wasn't built originally with mobile in mind, and the calendar can behave a little strangely on some devices. The training library was an area that I flagged for improvement, and it still needs a good amount of work to add more content there. I think that will be a good winter project for myself now that my weekends will be a little more free in the next few months.

Finally, we are always looking for volunteers to help out in this space. If anyone has any interest in these areas, please reach out. Also, we are always looking for more pictures to share in the newsletter, on Facebook or the website. If you have some you would like to share, please forward them along. It will be greatly appreciated.
