Date: July 15, 2023 Location: Sugarfoot Kennels, Burnham, ME

Director of Testing Report: Tyler was absent but the judges were lined up for all testing and had gotten all of the birds ordered for the tests and training.

Director of Training: Blaine Carter complimented the training committee on all their hard work and recognized them in the meeting. Training over 80 dogs in a clinic was successful with a lot of positive feedback. The training areas are directed at our testing programs.

Apprentice Hunter Camp: The camp is scheduled for July 21-July 23. NAVHDA Managing Director Kim Arnett will be attending. The focus is for kids that don't have access to hunting and fishing through their parents.

Director of Gunning: Matt Lorello stated that apprentice gunners were doing well, and testing and clinics had been managed safely and efficiently. Matt complimented the quality of the Yankee gunners. 


Yankee Youth Demo Dogs at Bay Day Event

Jason: "Being that the litter was raised around gun fire and taken through gun acclimation process showing no signs of sensitivities, I was comfortable with Savvy back there. Not something I'd recommend for most pups."

This morning I walked to cupboard and as I scanned the shelf in disappointment, I realized I had very little food available. I turned to the fridge, the condition there was even more dismal. I sighed and closed the door. What else have I been neglecting I thought. You see, I am three weeks out from the Invitational. I have been so focused on obtaining that VC title that I have been neglecting some important things like... you know... nourishment. As I reflect on this truth and my stomach pains with hunger, an article materializes in my brain. Advice I have given myself in the past reverberates and speaks to my soul.

I have test anxiety; it is attempting to creep in and take over my actions and steal my joy. It is not my friend, but it is real. I hear anxiety talking, it causes me to question my decision to run the invitational. It has me saying things to myself like:

"What if I fail?" "What if I embarrass myself?" "Should I even go?"

"What if I let the people down who have supported me and helped me train."

As I think about this and think about the questions circulating in my brain I come to an abrupt conclusion. "Me, hi I'm the problem, its me." This is a great Taylor Swift song, and it is ringing way too true now. I review the questions that anxiety is causing me to ask. Each of those questions contained an "I". My ego has crept in. I have lost the focus on what is important, and I begin to redirect myself.

I look down to a set of brown eyes and a bearded face, and it seems to say... "I LOVE THIS!! What are we doing tonight? Blind, field work, oh and I Love you!" Ember is a Wirehaired Pointing Griffon, my first versatile hunting dog; we began this journey 5 years ago. She can say a lot with those eyes. As I put myself in check, I recall my journey with Ember.

We joined NAVHDA so that I could learn to be a better handler, so I could be a better partner to Ember and give her the best hunting life. We headed to our first NAVHDA clinic when Ember was only a few months old. I watched Ember point her first bird and

then bound after it with ears bouncing and her little stubby tail wiggling back and forth, my heart leapt for her. I was hooked.

I landed at the Yankee Chapter and began training. I signed Ember and me up for our first test, and Ember received a UT Prize 2. I was elated. She acted like she had spent the day at the best doggie amusement park ever!! The following year we went back to try to obtain a Prize 1. This is where the lessons come in, the ones I need to remind myself of today as ANXIETY tries to occupy space in my head.

We did not obtain a prize 1 on our first attempt, or our second, third or fourth, not even on our fifth. I have a wall of six plaques. Only one of them reads Prize 1 score 204. I was visiting with Blaine Carter, an exceptional trainer who has helped Ember and I become a better team. He has a wall of NAVHDA Prize plaques. Not unlike mine, except most of his are for a Prize 1 and are for many different dogs. I gazed at that wall in awe, turned to Blaine and said, "You covered your wall with different dogs, I covered mine with just one."

Without missing a beat Blaine smiled over at me, with that mischievous grin and said, "You always had a Prize 1 dog, you're just a slow learner."

We both laugh but I know in his words there is truth. You see, me. I am the problem it's me.

Every time we fell short it was because I needed to plug a training hole. Sometimes my ego got the best of me, and I would run her again in a test without plugging those holes. Thus, the number of plaques.

Before Ember's last UT test, ANXIETY tried to creep in. What if we fail, what if I am embarrassed. Now looking back... I think: what if we hadn't tried?

My journey has led me to a valuable lesson. Anxiety is generally wrapped up with Ego. If we can put our Ego aside and focus on the journey, we will all be better for it. I didn't "succeed" by obtaining a prize the first time, or the second, or the...

If my wall only had one Prize 1 plaque, I would have missed some of the best parts of this journey, and Em-

ber and I are better for them. If I had listened to Anxiety and allowed my Ego to take over then I would have let myself and my dog down. Every plaque has a story, and the book behind each one is full of lessons and experiences. Looking back... if anyone had said you can have a Prize 1 on your first run, but you must give up all the lessons, friendships, and experiences you gained because you didn't. I can say with great confidence I would not take the deal.

Many people have asked what changed. What was different about my last test with Ember and why do I think we achieved a Prize 1. I think the answer comes down to TRUST and LUCK. I think I trusted that Ember and I had plugged the holes, and as we walked into the field (our first event). I felt a calm I had not previously felt. The anxiety was now excitement, and the test was now a walk with my best friend. While we prepare and train for all conditions with any success there is at least a small amount of luck. We ran on a day with sunshine, and moderate temperatures, a slight wind, and Ember didn't find the duck.

Remembering all of this helps me to remind myself of what is important about the Invitational. Ember is having a blast; WE have spent countless hours in the field forming friendships; WE have learned to volunteer and to cheer the success of others. WE have learned to encourage people when they have doubt and I have travelled places with Ember I never thought I'd go. My life is richer for the gifts of these experiences.

One of the biggest gifts from all our training didn't come during a hunt or during a test. It came in a nursing home in 2022.

You see, I spent Christmas of 2022 in a nursing home with my father, the man who fostered my love for hunting, and who shared my love for dogs. While he never owned a versatile dog, he loved following my journey with Ember. When he could no longer take to the woods, we would peruse Versatile Hunting Dog magazine and he would ask me questions. His eyes would light up through the fog of Alzheimer's and he would ask things like "What is steady to flush". I would explain and he would turn the page and ask another question. Christmas 2022 was his last Christmas, and I think we both knew it would be. He opened his presents through tears, and we fought through the sadness. When it seemed neither of us would be able to hold it together much longer, he asked me to go get Ember.



Because of the obedience part of Ember's training, I was able to walk to my truck, place an elf hat on Ember's head, and walk her back into the nursing home. She spent the next hour brightening the Christmas not only for my father but for all the residents in his unit. The last picture I ever took of my father, was that day he is sitting next to Ember, and she is wearing her elf hat.

So, as I push my anxiety and my ego aside, I don't know if Ember will return from the Invitational with a VC title, but I do know we will both return better for the experience, if I focus more on the journey and less on the prize.

EPILOGUE: This article was written in August; I have now been back from the Invitational for two weeks. A few days ago, I gathered with the group of Yankee members who trained together all summer. As we sat reflecting and sharing laughter and stories, it was abundantly clear that the journey together and the improved partnerships with our dogs was indeed the greatest prize.

Safe Excerise for Puppies

Misi Knutson sent us this excerpted article, "Can Exercise Damage a Puppies Growth Plates" which she shad hared with the Merrymeeting Kennels' new puppy buyers. Click on the link in the article to see the full piece and posted May 21, 2022, on the "Wiggles and Wags Blog" by Andy Long.

Is your little rascal driving you crazy? Do they have bounds of energy and then start biting, chewing and being mischievous? Your first instinct it that they need more exercise when in fact that can do more harm than good.

As odd as it sounds, exercise can, in fact, be harmful to a puppy. Now, although we know all dogs need a reasonable amount of exercise to thrive, too much at an early age can damage a puppy's growth plates. This works by preventing the bone from growing normally and in some cases, stops it from growing altogether. A clear sign that a growth plate has grown incorrectly can usually be spotted when a dog's wrist is not straight but starts to turn to the inside of the leg instead.

If a plate stops growing altogether, this can result in severe problems and complications. Shortening of the limb and even deformities can be the devastating result. While a dog's growth plates are still soft, it is essential they are exercising at a level that is suited for them. Activities that are considered high impact should be avoided until the growth plates are fully closed, as should any activities that involve leg twisting, vigorous play and chasing Frisbees.

What Activities Are Suitable For A Puppy?

While your puppy's growth plates are maturing, you can encourage them to participate in low-impact activities, such as lead walking, exploring their surroundings by using their senses, and socializing with other dogs. Monitoring your dog and its activities while encouraging these low-impact exercises at a younger age will help protect its delicate growth plates.

Simple games such as hiding a ball and swimming can be enjoyable. Nose work is a game that involves hiding a treat in one box and leaving the other five boxes empty. The dog then has to sniff out which package contains the treats. This is a gentle game that never gets old and encourages the dog to use its senses and brain, as well as some delicate maneuvering around to find the box with the treats. Never underestimate how problem-solving games have the potential to stimulate and wear your puppy out as much as an active play session. For the full article:

From Misi:

Here are some great mental / enrichment activities I did with Wren.

-- Scent training: line kibble on your floor leading to a pile of kibble. Start easy and make harder as they become more efficient.

-- Short sniff walks in your yard on leash.

-- Hallway Fetch: Pile of toys at the end of the hall. This helps with recall and fun retrieves. This is a good way to start teaching fetch as it limits where your dog can go before bringing back to you.

--Take old shirts or dish towels and roll up kibble and knot them. They have to work through untying the fabric to get to the kibble.

-- Toilet paper or paper towel rolls filled with kibble.

-- Hide and seek

-- Puzzle games

-- Obedience: Don't forget your 5 minute training sessions as enrichment activities.

Lastly, like kids, puppies need naps and lots of them. A good quality nap can completely change a pup's disposition. You may already notice they start chewing on you and after a few minutes crash. Just like kids when they get overtired, puppies misbehave too. The crate is the best and safest place for a nap and they should want to go there to rest from all the confusion of the house. Your other animals will appreciate it too.


